BLESSED IS KING JESUS!

How quickly Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem turns into a prelude for his passion and death on Palm/Passion Sunday! Those who read the passion narrative on this day may wonder how it is that victory and agony can occupy such close proximity. The holy gospel according to Saint Luke records that Jesus entered Jerusalem on a lonely colt. He didn't arrive in an elaborately decorated carriage pulled by a big stallion—quite likely the preferred method of arrival by great political figures in the first century. No, Jesus entered Jerusalem humbly seated on the back of a humble colt. This colt had never been ridden before Jesus had needed him. Neither did it have a hand-tooled leather saddle. The disciples simply threw their coats on its back for Jesus to simply sit on.

So Jesus' entry into Jerusalem was not really a triumphal entry at all. This was not like a conquering emperor coming into the great and mighty city. Jesus did not seem interested in seizing any kind of political opportunity. Neither did he want to evade his responsibility.

In Saint Luke's account, Pilate asked Jesus if he was the "King" of the Jews. Jesus' response was one of seeming indifference to that kind of authority: "You have said so."

Our greatest mission in the world is much the same as our Lord Christ's as he entered the Holy City of Jerusalem on a humble and simple colt. We are not called to conquer the world, but to face our tasks and proclaim God's good news humbly, with full awareness of the difficulties we will encounter.

Our distinct mission, like Christ's, is not to avoid the painful realities of the crosses we bear in our everyday lives, but to face them head-on, full and faithfully knowing that God will ultimately see us through, onward and upward to the promise land. Alleluia and thanks be to King Jesus who gives us the victory!.
