Pastor's Ponderings

BORN FOR YOU

To frightened shepherds on the edge of town, an angel makes a startling announcement: To you is born a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. One who saves. Saves us from what? In the gentle glow of our Christmass celebrations, we might pause for a moment to ponder this very important question. Jesus came to destroy the power of sin and death that accompanies once our separation from God.

"To you this day is born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." This announcement is made not just to the shepherds in the field two thousand years ago, but to all who hear these words in faith. This word is a plural "you". Like how I say a plural "you" "all ya'll". This good news is for all ya'll people: for all of God's favored children of every time and place. 

Blue or Purple and rose for Advent? That is the Question

A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. - Prophet Isaiah 11:1 He [John the Baptist] went into all the region around

the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins,

- Saint Luke 3:3.

If you travel around to visit family this Advent season and worship together at their home congregation you might find that the decorations may be a different color. In some churches you may find vestments and paraments all adorned in a beautiful blue. In other places you may find deep and sober purple. Why do some Church's go blue during Advent while others are purple?

Historically, most churches have adorned themselves in purple during the Advent season as Purple is a color of repentance. Notice how purple also shows up during Lent when we are preparing for Easter, which is white/gold. This color purple prompts us to reflect, confess, and repent of our sins as we seek to prepare ourselves for the victory of God. However, Advent has often been seen as a sort of "mini-lent" as we seek to prepare ourselves for the birth of Emmanuel at Christmasstide which like Easter is white/gold..

Blue has gained more recent popularity as a color of Advent, which seeks to promote the expectation that we feel as we await the presence of God in this world. The color blue prompts us to look ahead with eagerness and joy as something unprecedented and amazing is about to happen. In Advent we also have the rose (not pink) candle/ vestments/paraments that reminds us of the "halfway" mark of both the seasons of Advent and Lent. It is a little reprieve from the solemness of each season. This halfway mark is also known as Gaudete Sunday meaning, "Rejoice" in Latin on the third Sunday during Advent, and Laetare meaning

"Rejoice" in Latin on the fourth Sunday during Lent. Again, rose vestments and paraments can be used to observe this midway mark in both seasons.

In truth, both blue, purple, and rose lift up an important aspect of this season. We are eager to meet the God who made, loves and sustains us.

But we also want to tidy up the homes of our hearts a bit too.

Christmas is a time of refllection and celebration. It's when Christians celebrate God's love for the world through the birth of the Christ child, Jesus. The message of Christmas is that where there is hope, love, light and life, the plan and purpose of God will reach.

"Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to all on whom his favor rests.'




Family Faith Meal.... an APPS spin-off



Amahl and the Night Visitors at Emmanuel Episcopal December 12th 5:00 p.m.


