Pastor's Ponderings

Are you willing to become a sign of vulnerability?

The true miracle of Christmass is not that God comes to earth, but that God becomes the most vulnerable and dependent of creatures; a tiny baby who can only cry to make His needs known (sounds like us, doesn't it?). The mystery of Christmass is not that God is the maker of heaven and earth, but that God rules from the humble throne of a manger, among messy stalls and straw piles. "This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger" (St. Luke 2:22).

What draws us to this humble sign of a newborn child? Perhaps this very little innocent child is a reflection that exposes the weak and vulnerable we are afraid to admit or face ourselves. There is great pressure on adults and older children *not* to show any signs of weakness or making oneself look vulnerable. We work hard to appear in control, in full command on the job or among friend and family.

When children look to us in times of uncertainty and fear, we as the adults try very hard not to revile that we too are possibly fearful or scared about the uncertainty of life's unpredictability. For when we look upon the face of a very tiny and fragile face like a baby we are confronted with a little being who has no control, we become aware of our own fragile lives, of pain or grief that we cannot manage.

But something deeper comes in this little sign of vulnerability. The birth of a baby and the awesome responsibility it brings is a *Kairos* ('the right, critical, or opportune moment'): a life altering gift from God that breaks into time itself and remakes the whole world. Jesus is God's supreme Kairos moment, breaking into our loves and bringing what we could not provide on our own: healing, forgiveness, reconciliation, peace, and a love that is deeper and stronger than any human love could ever go.

In this little innocent child that the whole world receives at Christmass, God becomes one of us in all ways, but sin. God becomes vulnerable just like you and me. God takes on our messy lives, so that we might live in a new way, a way we could not imagine by yourselves. On the most holy night of the year the Ruler of heaven and earth enters our lowly hearts and minds and bodies, our common, humble lives, our human flesh, and declares, "You will be a vulnerable sign of my presence, with a divine spark of love, peace and great joy.

The tradition of decorating the altar and chancel with poinsettias will continue this year. Orders will be taken through


Sunday, December 11th.


Once Upon a Christmastime
