"But I am like an olive tree flourishing in the house of God; I trust in God's unfailing love for ever and ever." Psalm 52:8

"But now he has reconciled you by Christ's physical body through death to present you holy in His sight, without blemish and free from accusation. Colossians 1: 22.

To the Saints of Saint Paul Church,

We begin, yet again, another month! The year of 2021 A.D. is just rolling right along. Even though I realize it's just only February, it seems that this year is running fast for me already. But this month brings for us many anticipations. It may be your birthday, wedding anniversary, the month of one or more of your children's or grandchildren's birthday, or maybe the anniversary month of a loved ones death, and of course, St. Valentine's Day. There's also another observance that we will be remembering during this month on February 17th. Can you guess what that is? This year on our liturgical calendar, the holy season of Lent begins on Feb. 17th. And even though we are still very much in a time of a global pandemic I (as your shepherd) still plan to distribute ashes to the congregation on Ash Wednesday. Though we are not worshiping together in-person for Ash Wednesday, I do plan to have the church nave and sanctuary open on Ash Wednesday from 7a.m. to 6p.m. for anyone who may want to come and receive the sacramental symbol of their faith upon their forehead. I will be adhering to all the proper protocols on this day with masking, sanitizing cloths etc. Again, there will not be a corporate (in-person) worship that day, but you are more than welcome to come as you are to receive your ashen cross and stay and pray if you wish.

Lent (meaning spring) is a time of committing (if possible) to fasting, as well as giving up certain luxuries in order to replicate the account of the self-sacrificing nature of our Lord's journey into the desert for 40 days. Many Christians throughout the world in observance of these holy days add a Lenten spiritual discipline, such as reading a daily devotional or the bible or praying through a Lenten calendar to draw themselves closer to Christ and God our father. If one is not able to "give up" something, one can take on something new. Like helping out with a ministry or two here at St. Paul Church. Perhaps helping to distribute much needed items for Bountiful Blessings on Thursdays would be a good place to start. Or joining our LOFT (Living Our Faith Together) class time following worship. There are endless ways in which we can grow spiritually during this time of Lent. I pray that you may make a commitment this Lenten season to be more intentional in what you may do as part of your pre-Easter devotion. Whatever you choose to do during this most holy season of our faith, do it with Christ as its center, as we meditate upon the greatest self-giving gift humanity has ever received.

The above scriptures and Dr. Luther's commentary on these passages are the first step to your Lenten discipline. What is it to be *Simul Justus et Pecator*? See what Luther has to say about this Latin phrase. Blessed Lenten journey children of God.

FATHER LUTHER'S COMMENTARY

A Christian is *Simul Justus et Peccator* (righteous/saint and a sinner at the same time before God)- both a friend and an enemy of God. The philosophers will not admit this paradox because they don't accept the right way of becoming justified. That's why they demand that people keep on doing good works until they don't feel sin anymore. This teaching has caused many people to become very distraught, because they strived as much as they could to become completely righteous but could never achieve it. Even among those who spread this godless teaching, countless numbers of them have fallen into despair in their hour of death. This would have happened to me if Christ hadn't mercifully looked upon me and fed me from this error.

In contrast, we teach and comfort troubled sinners this way: Dear brothers and sisters, it's impossible for you to become so righteous in this life that you won't feel sin anymore. It's impossible for your body to become as bright and spotless as the sun. Though you still have wrinkles and spots, in spite of this, you are holy. But you may wonder, "How can I be holy since I sin and feel sinful?" sinners holy."

A Word from the President


The church council met via a Zoom video conference on January 12. The focus was on preparing for the annual congregational meeting which was held on Sunday, 31 Jan 2021 via Zoom. The council approved the agenda for the meeting and determined that was best to meet on -line for the meeting rather than in-person for the safety of our members due to the continuing COVID-19 infection rate within the local community. The council also determined that we should continue on-line worship services, Bible studies, and meetings until the pandemic situation improves.

The finance committee and staff are currently waiting for a non-profit certification from the Federal Internal Revenue Service so that we can proceed with setting up on-line donations on our web-site and Facebook page. This will allow us greater flexibility in reaching our giving goals. Not meeting in person each week has made it difficult for our members to contribute. Despite the difficulties caused by the pandemic, the congregation has weathered last year's financial storm well and did not have to reduce our cash reserves too much.

This will be my last article for *The Spire* as hosting the annual meeting was my last action as your Congregational President. It has been an honor and privilege for me to be your Congregational President for the past three years. There is much to be proud of in our accomplishments as a faith community during this time. However, it is time to let someone else fill this role of leadership for us. We are in an excellent positon to reinvigorate our ministries again once we can safely resume meeting inperson. I hope everyone will continue to enjoy the Epiphany season with family and friends as we prepare for the coming Lenten season. Our church council will meet next on 9 February 2021.

LOFT Living Our Faith Together Bible Study


