Pastor's Ponderings

#### PRUNED AND GROWNING

While trees are in their dormant period this time of year it is a season for cutting them back or pruning them. Rather than hurting the trees, pruning—when done correctly—can improve the shape, future growth, and fruit-bearing potential of a tree. The holy season of Lent can also be a time for pruning that which is misshapen in our lives. Lent can be a time for us to get rid of those things that may be preventing spiritual growth within ourselves and within our faith community. We trim things back and get closer to the vital trunk and root system that is our source. Lent is a time, then, for getting back to basics, for getting back to those things that truly sustains and nourish us to be whole and well established once more.

We rightly begin this holy season by returning to God's word and to the Lord's holy supper that nourishes and sustains us as no other meal can do. We return in this season for another fundamental source: holy baptism. Many of us will receive an ashen cross upon our foreheads on Ash Wednesday that retraces the spot where we were marked and sealed with Christ's cross on our first day as God's holy child. At baptism we were told that we are dead to sin but alive with and in Christ Jesus.

We are reminded in this most holy season that we are but dust, and that one day we will all return to a place where only God will finally have control over us. So we are dead, but we are also even more alive in Christ. This is the greatest mystery of our faith. This is the greatest news we have to share with the world: that even at our most worst, we are saved and strengthened by God. Even in our most dormant states, God is making us ready to achieve our fullest possible grow with His help

So, how shall I begin this pruning you ask? We offer a number of opportunities to do this at Saint Paul Church. <a href="PLEASE">PLEASE</a> look at the weekly announcements in your bulletin and also the bulletin board for sign-up sheets! We are planning a weekly Spiritual Retreat, weekly new members/catechism class, as well as our normal weekly Wednesday Vespers at 6p.m., and our 8:30 Sunday morning class in the Luther Chapel about Spiritual Formation. Mrs. Debbie Streicher will also offer once again P. L. A. C. E. (Personality Discovery-Learning Spiritual Gifts-Abilities Awareness-Connecting Passion with Ministry-Experiences of Life.) retreat starting in March. Please plan to participate with/in as many of these opportunities as you are able. These are very worthwhile ministries within our church that are offered for your direct spiritual growth. We are all in need of a little or a lot of pruning of our old selves, to clean our dead limbs away. Will you make this holy season of Lent the opportune time to do so? Now, is the acceptable time.

### Lent: Anglo-Saxon: "Spring"

The Forty-day (excluding Sundays-Mini Easters) season of penitence and preparation for the Triduum (three holy days, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday) and Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday, Lent is the first season in the Easter Cycle of the church year.

In the church year calendar, Lent is not as ancient as the Triduum or Easter. In the early fourth century, the death and resurrection of the Lord were observed together in a unified three-day celebration known as the Triduum, consisting of three days of fasting followed by The Great Easter Vigil.

By the middle of the fourth century, an additional three-week preparatory period developed. Soon it was expanded to six weeks, or forty days prior to the Triduum. This additional preparatory period was known as Lent. It was the period of final, intense preparation of adult candidates (known as catechumens) who would be baptized at the Easter Vigil. For those who were already baptized, Lent was a period of time to review the meaning of life, the Bible, the Creeds, the Lord 's Prayer, holy Baptism, in preparation for the renewal of their baptismal vows at The Great Easter Vigil.

Lent also soon became a season of penitence in preparation for absolution on Maundy Thursday.

By the close of the fifth century, there was a desire to exclude Sundays from Lent, since Sundays were not fasting days, and thus Lent was extended to the Wednesday before its first Sunday. This Wednesday, originally known as the "Beginning of the Fast," has been called Ash Wednesday since the late eleventh century.

The forty days of Lent recall our Lord's forty-day fast in the wilderness after his Baptism (St. Matthew 4: 2;St. Luke 4: 1-2), as well as Moses' forty-day fast on Mount Sinai (Exodus 34: 28). Throughout most of Christian history, Lent has continued to have two primary purposes: the preparation of catechumens for Baptism at the Easter Vigil, and the baptismal renewal of all the faithful in preparation for Easter Day.

### From the president......

As <u>Easter approaches</u>, many of us spend the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Holy Week reflecting on the past year and preparing to honor Jesus's resurrection. In 2023,

Lent begins on February 22, on a day known as Ash Wednesday.
The Thursday before Easter, commemorates when Jesus gathered with his 12 disciples to celebrate Passover before he was crucified, which took place on Good Friday. Easter Sunday celebrates the day Christians celebrate Jesus rising from the dead, three days later.

The Lenten season is inspired by the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert preparing for his own sacrifice. In that same spirit of sacrifice and reflection,

many people

will give up something or spend the time thinking and praying about something important to them. Maybe that includes ways they can work toward being better or more prayerful people or ways to make the world a better place. Amen.

# Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper Tuesday, February 21<sup>st</sup> at 6:00pm



Shrove Tuesday signals the end of Epiphany on the church calendar. It comes the day before Ash Wednesday. This day is also called Fat Tuesday and Pancake Day.

The word shrove is the past tense of the word shrive, meaning to confess and seek forgiveness. Many Christians observe Shrove Tuesday and often host pancake suppers as a way to recognize the day. Eating pancakes on this day is believed to have come about as a way to use up butter, eggs, milk, and fat in preparation for fasting during Lent. We will gather in fellowship hall to eat pancakes and all things fattening on Shrove Tuesday.

The couple and their 9 year old daughter were in our community when the war broke out, have been unable to return and plan to settle in Cumberland.


Members of the community have already helped them begin English as a second language classes and enroll their daughter in school. The YMCA has given the family a membership as they



### Taking Faith Home Message During Lent




Lent begins on February 22,



Through your donation, the pantry was able to serve the many individuals and families that were referred to us in need of emergency food.


During 2022 the pantry received 1,165 referrals representing 3,433 people. Those served received 22,933 items of food and 5,775 miscellaneous items. Our clients received vouchers for perishable food that amounted to \$28,650.00. We also distributed 8,435 bonus food items.

The pantry has been in operation since the early 1960s with help from churches, organizations and individuals. The pantry has no paid employees, yet we operate five days a week from 10:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. with the help of many volunteers.
