From the President.....



Valentine's Day occurs every February 14. People around the world celebrate by exchanging greeting cards, candy, flowers, and gifts between loved ones. Christians honor Saint Valentine, who some say was a Roman Priest who performed secret weddings for soldiers forbidden to marry by the Roman Emperor Claudius II. Saint Valentine wore a ring with a Cupid on it—a Roman symbol of love—that helped soldiers to recognize him. He also handed out paper hearts to remind Christians of their love for God. Saint Valentine was executed by the emperor on 14 February 269 for not renouncing Christianity. Pope Gelasias I in 496 first established a Christian feast day to honor Saint Valentine. Today, Valentine's Day has become a time for Christians to show care and love for one another and remember God's love.

Sunday, February 13, a Valentine's Day Milestone Moment discussion outline, a treat, and an activity will be available for you to engage in caring conversations in your home with loved ones for Valentine's Day. Scripture conversations based on 1 Corinthians 16:13-14 will be part of the discussion:

What is Candlemas?

Candlemas is a traditional Christian festival held on February 2 each year. It falls 40 days after Christmas and commemorates the purification of the Virgin Mary (after childbirth, according to Jewish law) and the presentation of Jesus in the Temple. It is a time to bless candles that will be used during worship throughout the church year. It is also a tradition to bring candles to the church to be blessed and used in homes. Lighting of the candles throughout the year is a reminder of Jesus Christ, the Light of the World.

Sunday, February 6, Candlemas will be observed during worship when candles in the Sanctuary will be blessed. Candles will be provided for each household and blessed as well for use throughout the coming year in homes.

Season's Greetings From Bountiful Blessings Headquarters Mechanicsburg, PA

The Lord provided many blessings to Bountiful Blessings this year.

In January, Heavenly Haulers' Ministry was launched as a scrap metal ministry under Bountiful Blessings. Throughout 2021, the group recycled over 150,000 pounds of metal. High school students in the community and others, including the "core crew," dedicated their time to get the ministry underway. Many were first-time volunteers.

BB (as we know it) added four sites in Pennsylvania in 2021. New to the family are Harrisburg, Duncannon, York, and Irwin. Each site is making inroads into their communities. The York site recently had their first BB recipient family baptized.

Terry Orendi, head of the BB ministry, visited some of the sites and was proud to say not one of the ministries closed, not even for the pandemic. Stories shared by the families during these visits acknowledged that the recipients need Bountiful Blessings more than ever.

BB doubled its warehouse space on August 1. Another site is set to open in February 2022. The ministry has been approached by several more churches to open a chapter in BB.

Those at the headquarters of BB have formed a a Strategic Planning Committee which will determine the direction of the charity for the next 2 to 20 years. The committee includes two representatives from each site, a financial representative, and a pastor, among many more.

BB headquarters thanks the supporters who have held them up in prayer and provided financial support. The ministry continues to operate on a 100 percent volunteer staff. The following letter by the Cumberland Area Interfaith Ministerial Association (CAIMA) was published in <u>The Cumberland Times-News</u> in December.

The Cumberland Area Interfaith Ministerial Association (CAIMA) has had ongoing discussions regarding the many responses to the COVID pandemic. Recently we have come together from many faiths, concerned about the ongoing spread of COVID and the abrupt rise in the number of people being infected with COVID during the holiday season.

We have the opportunity and the responsibility to protect ourselves, our families, and our communities. We trust the strong guidance of the medical field as knowledge that God has given us. We join our voices as leaders of religious communities in support of the guidance of our health leaders, urging all in the Cumberland area (except those few cases contraindicated by their personal physicians) to be fully vaccinated, to wear properly-fitted masks fully covering nose and mouth in public gatherings, to maintain healthy distance, and to take measures to care for the gift of our immune systems.

Our religious beliefs teach us to love our neighbor. Our faiths do not grant religious exemptions for vaccinations. By contrast, our faiths require us to take steps to stop the spread of disease and to restore health to God's creation. We lament resistance that is based on claims to personal freedom or rights that put the lives and health of others at risk.

We pray for those in the medical community whose resources are stretched, who give of themselves day after day to care for us. There have been over 10,000 COVID cases in our county of 70,000 people. At present, cases are on the rise instead of stopping. Keep up to date on vaccines. Avoid unnecessary risks. In this sacred season, we pray for our community, for enjoyment of family, for spreading of health and love, for a wonderful celebration of life for all. Be blessed and safe.
